County cricket was then limited in its scale and so, to make a living he travelled widely, taking part ? like a modern practitioner ? in matches in all kinds of formats. Naturally he played regularly for and against the gentlemen at Lord's. But he also appeared in single-wicket games, village cricket, in the All-England Eleven against eighteens and twenty-twos under the gangmaster William Clarke, even in 'three-a-sides'. Brian Rendell traces out the life of a quiet, dignified man, unaffected by and almost innocent of his celebrity, from his country beginnings to his poverty after the financial crisis of 1866.
