Museums in the Second World War Sep 27 2019 Exploring the role of museums, galleries and curators during the upheaval of the Second World War, this book challenges the accepted view of a hiatus in museum services during the conflict and its immediate aftermath. Instead it argues that new thinking in the 1930s was realised in a number of promising initiatives during the war only to fail during the fragmented post-war recovery. Based on new research including interviews with retired museum staff and access to museum archives and government records, this study reveals a complex picture of both innovation and inertia. At the outbreak of war precious objects were stored in numbers reduced, but although many museums were closed, others successfully campaigned to remain open. The museum thus emerges not as an isolated institution concerned only with the past but as a product of the changing conflicts and cultures within society.

Edith faced the trauma of Germany's destruction, the murder of her father and older brother in Auschwitz, her mother's irrational behavior, and the extreme poverty of the postwar years. She had to make a living by working, and wanted to catch up on her education. What followed were seven years of struggle, intense study, and hard work until finally, against considerable odds, Edith earned her Baccalauréat in 1949 and the Licence ès Lettres from the University of Toulouse in 1952 before coming to the United States. In America, Edith started at the bottom as an immigrant and eventually became a professor and later a financial advisor and broker. Since her retirement, Edith dedicates her time to publicly speaking about her experiences and the lessons from her life.
