Hart Crane's Poetry Jun 08 2020 In one of his letters Hart

Crane wrote, "Appollinaire lived in Paris, I live in Cleveland, Ohio," comparing—misspelling and all—the great French poet's cosmopolitan roots to his own more modest ones in the midwestern United States. Rebelling against the notion that his work should relate to some European school of thought, Crane defiantly asserted his freedom to be himself, a true American writer. John T. It was heralded as "a marvel of invention . . . a virtuoso performance" (*The New York Times Book Review*) and a "novel [that] stands with the best that our nation has produced as literature" (*Los Angeles Times Book Review*). Now Peter Matthiessen brings us the second novel in his *Watson* trilogy, a project that has been nearly twenty years in the writing.
